Tonya is a dedicated conservationist who goes above and beyond for her county, her farmers and the natural resources in Green County. She has generated excitement and passion around conservation and regenerative farming in the region and has supported the farmers in her area that are trying new farming techniques to improve soil health and water quality. Her passion and hard work has resulted in a successful farmer-led watershed group, The Farmers of the Sugar River, as well as other clean water initiatives in the county. Tonya is a prime example of a government employee who truly is "here to help."

From Marie in Dane County:

According to the farmers and organizations that work with Tonya, she is a tireless Land and Water Conservation Department employee for Green County. She demonstrates her dedication to the department as well as the state's natural resources through her unwavering efforts to provide timely and productive assistance to the residents, farmers and landowners in Green County. She organizes field days for Farmers of the Sugar River, writes and manages their grant, and organizes their budget. According to several farmers in the group, she has grown in confidence over the past few years in the area of soil health and has brought her passion and knowledge to the county through field days, projects, and focusing on one-on-one interactions that bridge the sometimes widening divide between farmers and government. Tonya not only researches new farming ideas, but take the time to listen to her farmers, follow up as needed and make sure they are supported in their farming decisions.

In addition to her work with farmers and landowners in her county, Tonya has been active in youth engagement activities in the county like high school soil judging.

Through her dedication to strengthening partnerships between the county, state and non-profits, like Wisconsin Women in Conservation, Tonya has been able to reach underserved farming and landowner communities. Her work with women farmers and landowners differentiates her conservation portfolio and allows her expertise and care to reach further into the community. I have personally witnessed her use the rainfall simulator at events held for women farmers, as well as co-present with her local NRCS partner staff at events to promote conservation programs.

At the end of the day, it is dedicated staff, like Tonya who are effective in not only getting conservation practices established in her community, but supporting others in doing the good work that is needed to maintain and improve Wisconsin's soil and water resources. She has earned the respect of farmers and landowners in Green County, she has taken the initiative to go above and beyond what is asked of her as a county employee and she is a leader in conservation in the State of Wisconsin. We should all be lucky enough to have someone like Tonya working in our county.

From Todd in Green County:

Tonya Gratz was hired in 2003. She was green, but up to any challenge. She fit well into the staffing family and works well with co-workers, other agencies, and landowners. She is constantly looking at how to better serve customers.

She started a nutrient management program for farmers numerous years ago. Manure scales were secured to go out and weigh spreaders. Soil sampling techniques were taught to the farmers. She went the extra mile and did a lot of the preliminary work in writing the plan for the farmer. She loaded the fields, soil types, soil test results, etc. before the first class started. Three classes were scheduled for the writing of plans, but for those who needed it, one-on-one was done either at their home or in our office.

Tonya restarted the youth conservation field days. She organized volunteer speakers, fifth grade classes to attend, worked with the City of Monroe to obtain permits for using a park, the Green County Conservation League in securing insurance for the event, and Green County Farm Bureau and Compeer for lunch for the speakers. Field days are held one day in May and one day in October. Approximately 300 students attend the event annually and learn about soil, forestry, water invertebrates, fish

management, prairies, watersheds, soil and water conservation, aquatic invasive, drones bee keeping, and wildlife management.

I believe her biggest accomplishment is the startup of the Producer Led Watershed, Farmers of the Sugar River. She works with their Board of Directors in writing of a DATCP grant to secure money, setting up the annual meeting and garnering speakers and lunch for the event, lining up field events, farm tours, and educational activities, and acting as the collaborator for the group.

Tonya has been a great promoter of soil health and the planting of cover crops. She has set up farm field tours of cover crops for farmers. Fliers with maps were available for farmers to go out at their leisure to look at different types of covers that were marked with posts and signs, and explained the type of cover crops planted, seeding date, and what is was seeded in to.

She has a background in GIS. Tonya has set up databases for new wells, properly abandoned wells and all the manure storage structures in the county. She also updates our department website.

At our monthly committee meetings, one of the agenda items is educational demonstration, where Tonya has something prepared to share with the committee and attempt to educate them on something related to conservation.

Tonya increases her knowledge of engineering each year. She works well with landowners and contractors on the installation of practices.

Tonya has a broad range of responsibilities in Green County. From surveying and designing projects, construction inspection, administration of various programs, educational activities, and the working with others in the office to others in the community.

Outside of work, Tonya and her husband Tony, have three daughters. Tonya is a 4-H leader. Tonya and Tony recently bought a 35 acre woods to tinker with. She is also a speaker at one of the breakout sessions this year at the conference.

Dear WI Land + Water,

It's my absolute pleasure to recommend Tonya Gratz for an Outstanding Conservation Employee Award. Tonya and I have worked together since I joined Extension in 2020, and I continue to be impressed by her dedication to local conservation programming, her contribution to many partnerships, and her service for Farmers for the Sugar River.

I started to work with Tonya, while coordinating the southwest regional producer-led groups. Her inquisitive and unassuming nature provided a welcoming and open environment for partnerships to flourish. She provides succinct and pertinent feedback to discussions, always prioritizing farmers' needs. It quickly became apparent what a conservation powerhouse Tonya was. She is a reliable colleague who always attends meetings and provides meaningful feedback to project ideas. She regularly volunteers to help moderator sessions for the Wisconsin Cover Crop Conference and this year, did not hesitate to volunteer to host a roundtable during the Wisconsin Water and Soil Health Conference.

Tonya is always learning and listening for content and collaborations that will fit Farmers for the Sugar River's needs. Her strong relationships with the community became apparent this year while working on both nitrogen and phosphorus projects. She has been working with Kevin Masarik on well water monitoring in Green County, a potentially contentious topic. She was able to get local businesses to sponsor meals for an educational event and went farm to farm promoting the event. The event was a huge success with over 30 people in attendance and has spurred continued work in the area. During strategic planning, Tonya suggested doing nitrogen rate trials to calculate nitrogen use efficiency on county land. That very same day we toured the plot location and had drafted a protocol and outreach plan.

This year I started a soil test phosphorus project that aimed to look at surface levels of phosphorus and if there are systems that minimize risk with continued application of fertility. I was behind on sampling and was worried about the ground freezing. Her positive attitude and commitment started the whole statewide project off on a great foot and renewed by excitement to the work. Tonya had recruited 4 farmer participants. I called on a Friday afternoon to create a sampling plan. She immediately offered to coordinate with all the farmers and even help soil sample. When we started on Monday morning, she had mapped out our route, and each farmer was ready with field maps upon our arrival. Driving around Green County was a testament to her relationships with farmers, the trust and warm welcome we got when arriving on a farm is rare and left a strong impression. She immediately followed through with scheduling a time to go over the results, guaranteeing the whole farmer group would benefit from the outreach.

Tonya always comes to meetings with a new piece of data and questions on how farmers can interpret, always seeking to better her and Green County's understanding of conservation agriculture. Tonya's persistent commitment and excitement for conservation deserves to be recognized this year. I recommend Tonya Gratz to be an Outstanding Conservation Employee for 2024, as I know the landscape of Green County would not look the same without her. 
